Description

The shallow domed cover with concentric rings, centred by a lidded spice box and three baluster shaped finials to hold the dippers when not in use, the bowl with a low filet, on a short stem and spreading circular foot.

Wassail bowls were used for toasting, the name thought to be derived from the Anglo Saxon 'waes-hael' ('wass-heil' or 'was-haile') meaning 'good health', at Christmas time and also originally other important ceremonial and festive dates throughout the year. Lignum vitae became a popular choice for larger and more formal wassail bowls in the 17th century and it is suggested that they developed into something of a status symbol for well-off families.
